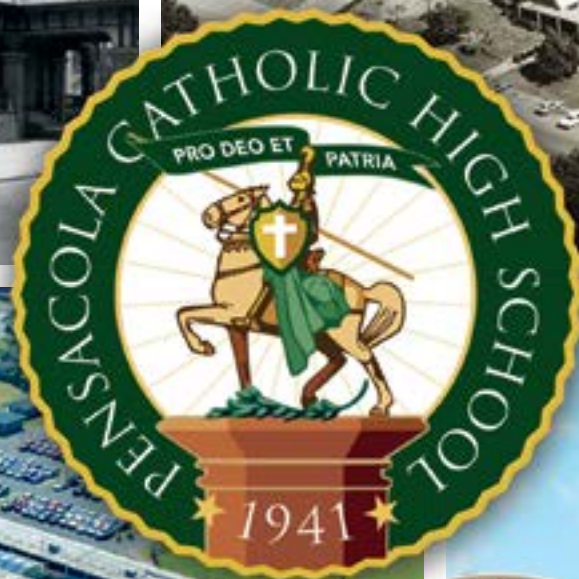
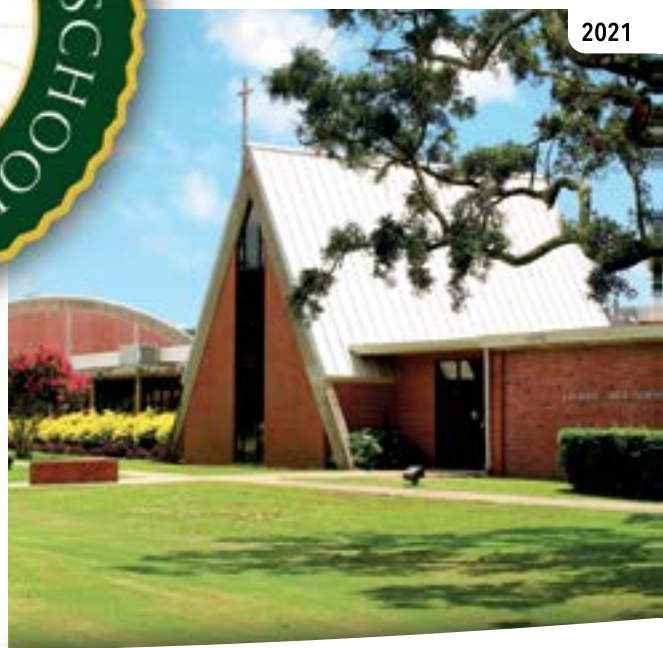

QUIZ-SADERS COMPETE FOR FIRST TIME

Seven students, the "Quiz-Saders", representing Pensacola Catholic High School competed in their first Academic Quiz Bowl tournament on the weekend of October 30-31 in Niceville, FL finishing in the top eight. Thirty teams faced off in a head-to-head, timed competition with questions taken from all academic disciplines, current events, and popular culture. The Quiz-Saders had a rough start in the preliminary rounds and were seeded 29th, but after shaking off their nerves they rallied to beat the #4 seeded team and then finished in the top eight. This is the first Academic Quiz team that Catholic High School has fielded in many years. Under the direction of their moderator, beloved History teacher Leo Bowersox, the students have been practicing since August and are looking forward to picking up additional tournaments in the spring.

CHS STUDENTS EARN NATIONAL RECOGNITION



Congratulations to our Pensacola Catholic High Students who were among 32,000 students from across the country to earn academic honors from the College Board's National Recognition Programs! These National Recognition Programs grant students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and can connect students with universities across the country, helping them stand out during the admissions process. Colleges and scholarship programs use these honors to identify students through College Board's Student Search Service. These students earned this recognition based on their outstanding performance on the PSAT/NMSQT, PSAT 10, and/or AP Exams and their exceptional academic achievements in the classroom. To be eligible students must have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams. Eligible students are invited to apply during their sophomore or junior year and are awarded at the beginning of the next school year. Seniors recognized include Maggie Johnson - National Merit

Commended Student; and Alexis Dillard and Hailey Lewis-Steffensmeier - National African-American Recognition. Juniors also recognized include Kayla Balfour and Quentin Wright - National Hispanic Recognition. - *Students are in order of mention in the article.*

IT'S ROCKET SEASON AT CATHOLIC HIGH!

The Space Technology and Engineering class has begun the final phase of our first-semester work and the rocket launches have begun! Each year the first semester of Space Tech covers a single lab from MIT's Aero/Astro Department through their OpenCourseWare initiative. Every Aero/Astro graduate from MIT must complete this lab as part of a required course called "Unified Engineering". "Unified" has long been held as the most difficult course in the entire undergraduate curriculum at MIT. And, according to tradition, Aero/Astro majors at the school are allowed to call themselves 'Rocket Scientists' on completion of this lab. Completing the lab does take our Space Tech class all semester. But, taking a little bit longer on the lab only makes sense since our students had to make their way from Galileo's parabolic trajectories through today's task of taking the definite integral of pressure with respect to volume as part of a thermodynamic analysis of their rockets. So, please congratulate our Space Tech kids when you see them and consider this a "heads up" -- there are rockets flying!





WELCOME TO THE FAMILY

In June, we welcomed Sarah Thomas to the faculty of Catholic High as our new Music Teacher and Band Director. Sarah is originally from Watseka, Illinois but graduated from Biloxi High School in Mississippi before attending the University of South Alabama where she majored in Music Education specializing in percussion. Music has been a part of Sarah's life since she was 7 years old and over the years has been part of many different types of musical groups from concert bands, marching bands, choirs, and even steel drum bands! Sarah loves being here at Catholic High to share her love of music with her students and our community.

NEW CALCULATORS FOR CHS

Pensacola Catholic High School recently received over \$80,000 worth of Texas Instruments TI-84+ CE Python calculators, entirely funded through the EANS grant program. Math Department Chairperson, Maria Green, and the Technology Department at CHS including Tech Coordinator, Amanda Long, and Media Specialist, Jennifer Buer, worked with Texas Instruments to secure the state-of-the-art calculator for Catholic High Students. This latest version of the TI calculator is approved for the PSAT, SAT, and ACT exams. The Catholic High Math curriculum for many years has provided instruction to our students on how to effectively leverage calculators to complete complex problems in a timely manner - now they all have the latest version.



WE'VE GOT THE SPIRIT! HOW ABOUT YOU?

The Pensacola Catholic High School student body and faculty were so excited to gather for real "in person" pep rallies prior to some of their home games this year. The student body assembled outdoors in the home stands of Gorecki-LeBeau Stadium on campus to cheer on their football team. Students were led in cheers by both the Varsity and Junior Varsity cheerleaders accompanied by the Crusader Band. The CHS Dance Team also performed for the student body while the football players looked on. Students were seated by class and competed for cheering honors. Junior and Senior classes usually won the competitions for being the loudest, with the Sophomore and Freshmen students progressively getting louder as the pep rallies continued and they began to understand what was "at stake." PHENOMENAL SEASON FOR CHS VOLLEYBALL



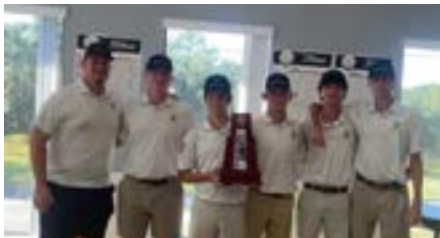

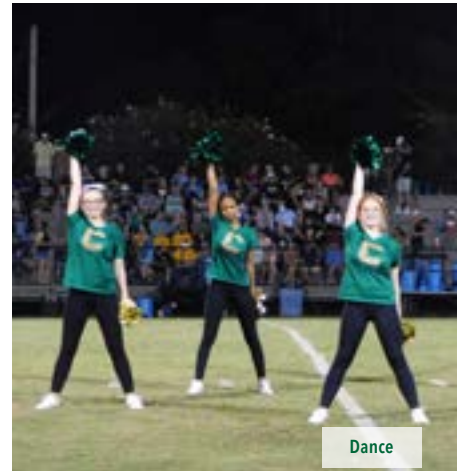

EUCHARISTIC MIRACLES EXHIBIT VISITS CATHOLIC HIGH

If most Catholics are truly honest with themselves they would admit that at one point in their faith journey they have wondered, "is that REALLY the body and blood of Christ?", as they watched the priest consecrate the host and wine during Mass. I think it is only human nature to have had that thought, but we also need to remember that it is Jesus himself at the Last Supper who, "and after he had given thanks, he broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me.' And in the same way, with the cup after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial to me.'" (1 Corinthians 11:24-25). The priest at every Mass during the Eucharistic prayer calls upon the Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the body and blood of Jesus and repeats these words found in St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. This is truly a "mystery of our faith". By definition, a mystery is something that is difficult or impossible to understand or explain. For Catholics, the transubstantiation or conversion of the Eucharistic elements into the body and blood of Christ at the moment of consecration, is truly a mystery, and we are called to rely on our faith -- "Jesus gazed at them and said, 'By human resources it is impossible, but not with God: because for God everything is possible.'" (Mark 10:27).

At Catholic High School during the week of October 18, we were very blessed to have had the opportunity to learn about the Eucharistic Miracles of the World through the Vatican International Exhibition. Fifty-five panels with details on forty-one of the 152 Church-approved Eucharistic Miracles were on display for our students, faculty, parents, and alumni to peruse. Bill and Peggy White, CHS alumni and high school sweethearts from the class of 1963, were on hand with the exhibit which is on loan to them from the Archangel Radio Organization in Fairhope, AL. Since January of 2020, Bill and Peggy have been traveling all over the nation taking the exhibit to parishes and schools that are interested in learning more about the inexplicable happenings of these miracles involving the Eucharist. Over 8,000 people have now seen the exhibit that Bill and Peggy have shared. The Eucharistic Miracles of the World exhibit contains information originally documented and cataloged onto a website by Blessed Carlo Acutis. At the age of eleven, Carlo created the website miracolieucaristici.org where he worked to catalog each reported Eucharistic miracle that he found through his research. He completed the website in 2005, but before he could finish visiting all of the miracle sites, he developed leukemia and died in October 2006. He was buried in Assisi, Italy per his wishes, and on October 10, 2020, was beatified following the Church's process for considering a person for Sainthood.



Eucharistic Miracles are events surrounding the Eucharist that a Church authority confirms have not been scientifically explained. The miracles



themselves are not the basis of our faith so we are not required to believe what they appear to show but they are most definitely more evidence of the Church's teaching that Christ is fully present in the Eucharist. The exhibits brought to CHS for the Catholic High Family to review ranged from the time period 600 A.D. to one of the most recent in 2013. Most of the miracles happened with people who were/are believers but there are also seven events documented involving people who were originally antagonistic to the Church's teaching about the Eucharist.

The first documented miracle in their exhibit occurred in Lancia, Italy in 750 A.D. According to the Miracle's website, a priest who doubted the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist was saying Mass and at the consecration, he witnessed the Host turn into Flesh and the Wine turn into Blood. Everything was visible to those in attendance and even today, visitors to the Shrine of the Eucharistic Miracle in Lancia can see the Holy relics from the miracle. In 1970, twelve centuries after the miracle occurred, church officials requested that scientific analysis be conducted on the relics. Dr. Eduardo Linoli, a professor of anatomy,

histology, chemistry, and clinical microscopy was asked to oversee the scientific investigation and in March 1971 presented a detailed report of the findings. There were five key findings: 1) the "miraculous flesh" is authentic flesh consisting of muscular striated tissue of the left heart ventricle, 2) the "miraculous blood" is true blood which the chromatographic analysis indicated with absolute and indisputable certainty, 3) the immunological study showed with certainty that the flesh and blood are human, and the immune-hematological test allowed confirmation with complete objectivity and certitude that both belong to the same blood type AB, the same blood type as that of the man of the Shroud and the type most characteristic of Middle Eastern populations, 4) the proteins contained in the blood have the normal distribution, in the identical percentage as that for normal fresh blood, and 5) no traces of salt or preservatives used in antiquity for the purpose of embalming were found.

Another Eucharistic Miracle documented in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1996 also underwent a similar scientific analysis. On August 15, 1996, a priest picked up a consecrated host that had fallen on the ground and he placed it in the tabernacle after putting it in a vessel of water to have it dissolve. When he reopened the tabernacle on August 26 he found that it looked covered by a reddish substance. In 2001 the samples were taken to Professor Linoli and his results were similar to his findings from the Miracle of Lancia. And, in March 2004, Professor Frederick Zugibe of New York at Columbia University, the renowned expert in forensic medicine of the heart, received the sample without knowing where it came from and was asked to provide his analysis. Professor Zugibe confirmed that the sample corresponded to muscle of the left ventricle and that the patient to

whom it belonged had suffered a great deal because it showed evidence which indicated that at certain moments there was a lack of oxygen. He also concluded that the patient had been struck at the height of the chest and that when the sample was first received in the laboratory that it showed dynamic activity, as if it were alive since it contained intact white blood cells that are transported only by the blood and usually disintegrate once blood is no longer flowing.

There were other miracles displayed that documented unexplained phenomena as it relates to the Holy Eucharist while on display for adoration, during attempts to decimate it, and various other circumstances. There were also several documented instances where believers lived for years, some as long as 50+ years, with only the sustenance of the Eucharist.

We are so thankful to the Whites for bringing this exhibit to us so we could learn more about these miracles and meditate more on our experience with this special sacrament of the Eucharist. While it was most certainly interesting to learn of these miracles that we can see and study, it is ever so important for us not to lose sight of the miracle that happens every day, every time a priest says Mass and consecrates the host and wine. We may not see it bleed, but we do believe in the miracle that it becomes the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ!

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HAVING FAITH – DOING GOD’S WILL

If you had told Paige (White) Roodhouse when she graduated from Catholic High in 2002 that in sixteen years she would be the Executive Director of a Catholic Montessori school in Lake Tahoe that she founded with her husband, she would’ve laughed and given you an incredulous look. “I left Catholic High with a desire to give back, but at the time I didn’t know how I would do that,” Paige reflects. “Catholic education was a huge gift in my life, so it’s wonderful to have come full circle. To be able to give that gift both to my own children and to the children in our community is a tremendous blessing.”

“My prayer for a long time was ‘God show me how you want me to serve you’” Paige shares. “Now I can see now how He prepared me along the way.” That preparation began with long hours on the Catholic High track, pushing herself to new limits, as well as late nights spent tackling Calculus and Chemistry, preparing her for the rigors of academic life at Notre Dame and later the challenges of life as a Naval Officer. “Those years at Catholic were formative years for me, where I found out who I was and what I was capable of.”



Paige met her husband, Alex, while attending the University of Notre Dame on a Navy ROTC Scholarship. There, she received her Bachelor of Arts degree in the Program of Liberal Studies, a Great Books program comprised of a curriculum spanning the arts, history, literature, philosophy, and theology. Alex was also in Navy ROTC and a Great Books major, so their paths crossed often before they started dating. They were engaged in October of 2006, following Paige’s graduation and commissioning as a US Naval Officer in May. They then spent fifteen months of their two-year engagement apart as each deployed overseas during the Iraq war. Alex spent nine months patrolling the Euphrates river as an officer with Riverine Squadron One, while Paige’s deployment took her to the Persian Gulf as one of five female officers onboard the USS PONCE, an amphibious transport ship that carried Marines overseas. She served as the Weapons Officer and Force Protection Officer, overseeing a division of 25 gunners mates who maintained the ship’s weapons, as well as training the crew in anti-terrorism response tactics. At the end of Paige’s first tour the couple married in Lake Tahoe, and Paige transferred to the Navy’s Expeditionary Combat Command where she led an Operations division at Mobile Security Squadron Five in San Diego.

At the end of her second tour, Paige and Alex welcomed their first child and then spent a brief time in the San Francisco Bay Area. They then decided to found a military training equipment company with friends and jumped at the opportunity to base the company in the same Lake Tahoe town they were married in years before. Their mountain home was wonderful in so many ways, but lacked a vibrant Catholic community. As their family grew, Paige and Alex longed for a Catholic school for their children. After homeschooling for several years, Paige began to pray about whether they should stay or move to a community that had the right school for their children.

“Saint Clare’s was really born of a desperate prayer,” Paige recalls, “I just prayed ‘God, where do you want our family?’” During this time, Paige remembers opening her bible to a random passage and John 10 jumped out at her: “I am the Good Shepherd. I know my sheep and they know me.” She remembers shutting her bible and thinking “How is that helpful?!” Later that evening as she and Alex were researching new places to live they found a Catholic Montessori School in Napa Valley, California. Paige clicked on a marketing video on their website and a few minutes in, she watched in amazement as a teacher read from the same passage from John 10 to her students. She immediately knew that God was speaking to her, and jokingly relates, “I almost fell off the couch.”

She and Alex drove down to visit the school. There they found their dream school - a beautiful campus complete with amazing teachers, buzzing classrooms filled with hands-on materials and built on a gorgeous working farm. During that visit, they asked the school’s director if they could enroll their children part-time so Alex could continue his business in Tahoe (and not miss ski season). “No” Paige recalls her replying, but she wasn’t ready for what would come next. “Have you ever thought about doing this yourselves?” They told her yes, but that it seemed like a tremendous amount of work. Then she spoke to their hearts, “Yes” Paige remembers her words, “It is a lot of work. But it is good work, and it’s what we’re called to do.” After leaving her office that day and without speaking a word to each other, the couple knew what they were going to do. “We really felt the Holy Spirit speaking to us through her.”

They went home, printed a banner and set up a booth at the next community event. “We began telling everyone we were opening a Catholic Montessori school, right here in Lake Tahoe.” At the time they had no building, no teachers, no funding, and no students except their own children. “We weren’t just out on a limb, we were hanging by a twig.” Paige laughingly recalls. That was May of 2018. Over the next three months God opened every door. They found classroom space for rent, wonderful teachers who moved to Tahoe to help them found the school, and a handful of students to enable them to open the doors of Saint Clare’s in August that same year.

What began as a dream has grown into a beautiful school community with dedicated families and almost 40 students filling two mixed-age Montessori classrooms. Saint Clare’s is “Joyfully Catholic and Boldly Adventurous,” the only Catholic school in the North Tahoe area, where students enjoy hands-on learning as well as all that the beautiful area has to offer. “We’re having to put people on waitlists because we’re running out of room at our current building and are now making plans for building our own campus.”

Now Paige can see clearly how her own journey has prepared her for the role she now holds as the school’s Executive Director and catechist, “Each step prepared me for the next.” Paige credits her parents’ values that they passed on to her, which were also echoed in her Catholic High education, as the basis for her desire to serve the Lord and those around her. Paige and Alex now have six children, four boys and two girls, the second daughter born in September of this year.

Many blessings to the Roodhouse family as they help the Catholic community in Lake Tahoe grow and thrive!

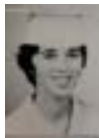
